## **Presbyterian Children's Village Announces Two Promotions in the Residential Treatment Program**

(Rosemont, PA) Presbyterian Children's Village (PCV) is pleased to announce the promotion of **Rebecca Spiegel** and **Tammy Robinson** to Treatment Team Leaders for the Residential Treatment Program. They will be responsible for directing treatment of residents and families and for leading the efforts of the interdisciplinary team in assessment, treatment planning and implementation, and discharge planning.

Spiegel has worked as a therapist for the Village Residential Treatment Program. Prior to arriving at PCV, she worked as a Clinical Case Manager for Elwyn Foster Care Services. She received her undergraduate education at Gettysburg College and her Masters of Science in Education – Psychological Services and Masters of Philosophy in Education from the University of Pennsylvania.

Robinson has been the Residential Treatment Admissions Coordinator for PCV. She worked previously as a Milieu Therapist for Andrus Children's Center and as a social worker for the Horsham Clinic Child and Adolescent Partial Hospital. She received her undergraduate education at Vassar College and her Masters of Social Work from New York University.

The Residential Treatment Program serves adolescents 13 to 18 years old with serious mental health and behavioral issues. It is a state-licensed and JCAHO-accredited residential treatment facility on the Rosemont Campus offering clinical treatment; a state licensed special education school for students with emotional, social, and special learning needs; 24-hour structured supervision; and psychiatric services.

Founded as an orphanage in 1877, Presbyterian Children's Village today is a non-profit corporation dedicated to the healing of the spirits of children, families and communities broken by violence, addiction, poverty, mental illness, racism and other serious societal problems. The Village serves more than 5,500 children each year in the greater Philadelphia area.
